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

David Stone's art is as simple and engaging as white acoustic soul with a Memphis-blues edge. Stone, who learned his craft from big band musicians in the Catskills in New York State, and fronted a number of them including the Cab Calloway, Lionel Hampton and Tommy Dorsey Orchestras, writes and sings about boy meets girl "and

there I go again." Though there is no mistaking his own very personal stamp on the genre, he inhabits the same world as the likes of Kenny Loggins, Dan Hart, Paul Carrack and Marc Cohen.

His debut solo release is on Xenon Records, out of North Hollywood and it is the only CD for sale on Lil' Hank's Guide for Songwriters at www.halsguide.com/stone. When you talk about "up and

coming," it is hard to know what the dynamics of exposure will do to an independent, but if Stone continues to rise at his present rate it is not unimaginable that this poet of the sweet art will not only find his audience, but as hokey as it sounds, the heart of the matter. —Joey Alkes
